

Fabri Journey & Personal Insights

Through my fabri journey, I found myself resonating most with concepts that held deep symbolic meanings, and often circled back to my Indian roots.

What is a Mandala?

A **mandala** is a geometric design or pattern that often represents the universe, wholeness, or a spiritual journey. The word "mandala" comes from the Sanskrit term for "circle," but it encompasses much more than just circular shapes.

Mandalas are deeply symbolic and are used in various cultures and traditions for meditation, healing, and spiritual practices.



Key Features of a Mandala:

Central Focus: Most mandalas begin with a central point, representing the core of existence or self.

Symmetry and Balance: Mandalas are typically symmetrical and radiate outward in intricate, repeating patterns.

Geometric Shapes: They include circles, squares, triangles, and other geometric forms, often layered in a harmonious arrangement.

Symbolism: Each element or shape within a mandala can have spiritual or cultural significance, such as representing the four directions, elements, or the interconnectedness of life.










Uses of Mandalas:

Spiritual Practices: In Buddhism and Hinduism, mandalas are used for meditation, prayer, and as a visual aid to spiritual focus, helping you align yourself with your spiritual & physical self

Art Therapy: Coloring or creating mandalas is used for relaxation, self-expression, and stress relief.

Cultural Symbols: Mandalas appear in various cultures as architectural designs (e.g., stained glass windows in Gothic churches) or ceremonial art.

Personal Growth: They can symbolize an individual's journey toward self-discovery and inner peace.














Abstract Mandalas

Freedom of Form: They may deviate from the traditional circular format. Symmetry is often optional or loosely applied.

Unique Patterns: Abstract mandalas incorporate irregular, organic, or non-repeating patterns. They often include flowing lines, unconventional shapes, or non-geometric forms.

Personal Expression: They are less about adhering to spiritual traditions and more about conveying the artist's emotions, thoughts, or creativity. Artists may use abstract mandalas to explore personal symbolism or storytelling.

Use of Color: Abstract mandalas may feature unconventional color schemes, such as gradients, splashes. Colors often reflect the mood or theme rather than symbolic meanings.

Integration of Mixed Media: They may combine digital elements, textures, or collage techniques.

Versatility: Abstract mandalas are often used in modern art, design, and fashion. They appear in tattoos, home decor, digital graphics, and personal journaling.

Depict suns, moons, stars, or planetary systems. Often symbolize the universe's vastness and the interconnectedness of all things







Project Idea

Creating an exclusive collection of jewelry inspired by celestial mandalas, infused with nature elements of traditional Indian embroidery.

The pieces will blend modern fabrication techniques like laser cutting and 3D printing with artisanal crafts such as embroidery, illustrations and DIY crystal embellishments.

By combining natural materials like wood and contemporary ones like acrylic, this collection aims to bridge tradition and innovation, creating wearable art that is meaningful, visually captivating, and unique.



Embodied Ideation Session

For this project, an embodied ideation session involves physically engaging with materials, forms, and movements to draw inspiration for the jewelry designs. By working directly with wood, acrylic, and embroidery threads, I allow tactile sensations and spatial awareness to guide the creation of mandala patterns.

- Gesture-based design: Using hand movements to draw mandala-inspired shapes, translating them into digital sketches.
- Material exploration: Experimenting with the weight, texture, and flexibility of materials to inspire form and function in the jewelry.
- Mindful practices: Drawing mandalas or meditating on celestial and natural themes to channel their symbolism into the design process.

This project acts as a design intervention by reinterpreting traditional mandala art through the lens of modern fabrication and sustainable practices.

- Revitalizing Mandala Motifs: Transforming spiritual and cultural symbols into wearable contemporary pieces.

Inspiration & Reference

1. Elie Top – Celestial Mechanics

- Key Insight: Elie Top combines celestial themes with mechanical precision in his jewelry, incorporating intricate moving parts and talismanic elements.
- Inspiration for Me:
 - Integrating kinetic movement into my designs to make elements like the moon phases or planets subtly rotate or shift.
 - A blend of traditional symbolism (sun, moon, stars) with modern, functional elements (hinges, rotating gears) for a dynamic look.





Inspiration & Reference

2. Anthony Lent - Sculptural Celestial Faces

- Key Insight: Lent's work often features sculpted sun and moon faces, evoking a dreamlike quality with a connection to folklore and mythology.
- Inspiration for Me:
 - Incorporate sculptural, 3D-printed elements of moon faces or sun rays into my jewelry.
 This would add a tactile, narrative quality to my pieces.
 - This approach gives my celestial mandalas a more mythological and humanized presence, connecting them to stories / emotions.







Inspiration In a Nutshell

1. Movement and Interaction:

 Inspired by Elie Top, integrate subtle kinetic movement in elements like rotating moons or pendulum-like sun rays.

2. Sculptural Details:

 Inspired by Anthony Lent, incorporate sculpted faces of the sun and moon using 3D-printed components.

3. Reflective Surfaces and Sparkle:

 From Van Cleef & Arpels, use laser-cut mirrored surfaces or crystal embellishments to simulate stars or cosmic reflections.

4. Layered Elegance:


Chaumet and Chanel emphasize symmetry and subtlety;

Relevance of the Project



- A product line that resonates with both artistic and eco-conscious communities.




Sketches

This duality inspired me to integrate their symbolism into the design, capturing their celestial essence through intricate patterns and layers.




Digital Prototypes

Techniques and Materials:

- Parametric Design: The intricate patterns are generated using parametric design techniques, offering customization opportunities for size and layout.
- Laser-Cut Precision: Clean, delicate lines emphasize the elegance of celestial forms.
- Embroidery and Reflective
 Surfaces: Adding dimension, texture,
 and visual contrast to symbolize light
 and motion.
- 3D-Printed Components: Sculptural celestial forms like the stars and moons to enhance depth and intricacy.

How

Sustainability: Using eco-friendly materials and techniques to create a collection that aligns with conscious consumer values.






Experimentation

I look forward to diving deeper into the process phase, where I can explore various techniques and materials to bring this concept to life.


